All pieces will be signed by Margaret Atwood


"Talking is very old," Margaret Atwood once wrote, "writing is not." If any literary form bridges oral storytelling with the written word, it is Gothic, a tradition rooted in folklore and folk-stories, long-told tales that make your heart beat faster and your skin crawl. Beginning with the 1764 novel *The Castle of Otranto*, the Gothic in literature, and more recently in film, has held equal sway over our conscious imaginings and unconscious minds. These stories never go out of fashion. They never stop scaring us half to death.

Canadians have been writing Gothic tales since the 19th century. Among our most famous occasional practitioners is Margaret Atwood herself. She is also a lifelong reader and watcher of Gothic tales. For the 2023 Storytellers Ball, we asked our co-founder to share 30 essential Gothic terms and expressions, phrases she has associated with the genre since she was a child.


Guess the Gothic, a word art project, conceived by committee member Lindsay Mattrick, created by Margaret Atwood and realized with Doug Laxdal and The Gas Company, on the original typewriter used by the author to work on many of her books, including *The Handmaid's Tale*. The project welcomes us into both the world of the Gothic in literary and popular culture, and, perhaps, a corner of the mind of a Canadian author.



















MARGARET ATWOOD

MARGARET ATWOOD, whose work has been published in more than forty-five countries, is the author of more than fifty books of fiction, poetry, critical essays, and graphic novels. In addition to *The Handmaid's Tale*, now an award-winning TV series, her novels include *The Testaments*, winner of the 2019 Booker Prize; *Cat's Eye*, short-listed for the 1989 Booker Prize; *Alias Grace*, which won the Giller Prize in Canada and the Premio Mondello in Italy; *The Blind Assassin*, winner of the 2000 Booker Prize; The *MaddAddam* Trilogy; *The Heart Goes Last* and, most recently *Babes in the Wood*. She is the recipient of numerous awards, including the Peace Prize of the German Book Trade, the Franz Kafka International Literary Prize, the PEN Center USA Lifetime Achievement Award, and the *Los Angeles Times* Innovator's Award. In 2019, she was made a member of the Order of the Companions of Honour for services to literature. She lives in Toronto.



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
